Worship Updates

Beginning May 9, the Worship returns to the sanctuary. Based on recommendations from experts at MIT on air flow and ventilation, the Center for Congregational Song on safe practices for singing and speaking in worship, the CDC on infection and vaccination rates, as well as feedback from our congregation members, the Worship Committee decided the best step forward for Concord was to open our Sanctuary doors for worship.

Worship will include many of our favorite and familiar moments, including an opportunity to share prayer requests prior to the service, spoken responses, and music lead by a few of our talented singers and musicians. Sunday school for all will follow.

However, a couple of mitigation practices will still be in place. In order to increase ventilation and air flow in the sanctuary, the main sanctuary and side doors will remain open throughout the service. We invite you to sit towards the front of the sanctuary to avoid potential road noise. Masks are still required. Both of these are essential to prevent the spread of an airborne disease and until cases are below 10 per 100,000 people in Iredell County, the most prudent steps we can take.

Other churches have made different choices based on what they consider an acceptable level of risk within their community. Concord has always prioritized care of one another as a primary value and therefore erred on the side of lower-risk practices. Our greatest hope is as vaccine rates rise and cases drop over the summer, we will be in the last weeks of these necessary practices.

We look forward to gathering together as one community on May 9. Please contact Pastor Liz or a Member of the worship Committee with questions or concerns.





March updates May 1, 2021



Dear Friends -

How has the pandemic changed you? As we begin to see what we hope is light at the end of this long, dark tunnel, I'm hearing people ask this question more often. As you reflect back on this past year, how are you different that you were in April 2020? What changes have you made, or more likely, what changes have been forced upon you? Here are a few I've heard named.

We're more technologically engaged. How many of us had used Zoom before the pandemic hit? I thought it was a nice novelty I'd used a couple of times for Webinars, but I had no idea the numbers of hours I'd be spending staring at beloved church members in little boxes on my computer screen. The pandemic forced us to learn new ways of communicating and plugging in and allowed us to include members spread far and wide. Some people have really learned to love the convenience of a Zoom meeting held in pajamas, while others have struggled with the same. I wonder, moving forward, how technology will continue to be incorporated into the life of the church.

We have different priorities. At least we do for now. The pandemic forced us to stay inside and away from the many activities that kept us busy - and distracted. Many of us found, once we were required to spend time at home, we actually kind of like our family. Others have focus more on their health, using this time to create better habits. And some of us have realized, because of the loneliness and isolation of the pandemic, we need to spend more time with those we love. Whether or not this carries over once the pandemic is finally at its end remains to be seen.

We realize the church is more than a building. We knew this in our heads, but we know it in practice. The church never closed, we just moved to different ways of being. The pandemic didn't stop us from worshipping, praying, and service. But it did force us to think creatively about how we do those things, like live-streaming funerals and reaching out to home bound members. The pandemic hasn't kept us from doing anything we've done before; we just had to figure out how to do it in new ways.

We know how important Sunday morning is. People need in-person worship. We have done our best to provide meaningful worship in ways people could access at home, but it's just not the same as worshipping together and hearing other voices. The Sunday morning ritual of church was one of the biggest losses for people. I'm hopeful and excited how, as the pandemic, we will be able to join together and share our voices, hopes, and smiles with one another.

The pandemic changed us in many ways, some for better, some for worse. I give thanks God walks with us through it all, and we can trust God's promises are good. May the lessons we learned make us better followers of Christ now and in the future.
